Sunday Mass at St Mary's

Attending Mass in Person

The Bishops have suspended the Mass Obligation, bearing in mind the protection of the vulnerable. They have asked us to continue to live-stream Mass and not to ask anyone in the vulnerable category – those over 70 and/or with medical conditions – to usher &c. There is no prohibition as regards attending Mass and each person, unless they are shielding, will decide what he or she will do. Those over 70 are advised, for the time being, however, not to come to Mass and, because of the age profile of the weekday mass congregation, there are no weekday masses for now.

Re-opening St Mary's for Mass

Here in Hendred we are grateful for the help of Fr Dominic Adeiza with the re-opening of St Mary's for Mass next Sunday at 11.15am. We hope next week or as soon after as possible to restart the 6pm. Those who come to Mass at present need to book to ensure admission: contact me on aburnham@portsmouthdiocese.org.uk. Sunday 5th July is now fully booked and some bookings have been made for the other Sundays in July. We need to have names in advance and to preserve a record for fourteen days in connection with 'Track and Trace'.

I hope most of the changes will be temporary but, during this emergency, there is no singing permitted, no bidding prayers, and the bishops have asked for homilies to be short. There will be no exchange of the Peace and Holy Communion will be administered in one kind, both parties extending their arm, and the communicant receiving the host on the flat of the hand. Stewards will ensure that individuals enter Church spaced at two-metres, and that a short and properly-spaced Communion queue is formed, pew by pew. Hand sanitiser must be used at the entrance and before receiving Holy Communion. If the priest accidentally touches the hand of the communicant, both will use sanitiser immediately after. The congregation will leave with similar spacing. The exception to all this is 'the household', who may sit together and socially space only from others.

Food for the Journey*

Friday 3rd July 2020 St Thomas the Apostle

St Thomas the Apostle was called 'Didymus' (the twin) and, though he is remembered as 'Doubting Thomas' (because he would not believe in the Resurrection until he himself had seen the Risen Christ), he was brave when Jesus and his disciples set out for confrontation in Jerusalem. He made the most profound confession of faith in the New Testament when he exclaimed 'My Lord and my God'. Tradition tells us that St Thomas suffered martyrdom in India, where he preached the faith. More than one Christian communities in India look back to St Thomas as their founder.

III Reading

John 20:24-29 (RSV)

Thomas is convinced by the Resurrection

Now Thomas, one of the twelve, called the Twin, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, 'We have seen the Lord.' But he said to them, 'Unless I see in his hands the print of the nails, and place my finger in the mark of the nails, and place my hand in his side, I will not believe.' Eight days later, his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. The doors were shut, but Jesus came and stood among them, and said, 'Peace be with you.' Then he said to Thomas, 'Put your finger here, and see my hands; and put out your hand, and place it in my side; do not be faithless, but believing.' Thomas answered him, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him, 'Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe.'

IV Reflection

Thomas is convinced by the Resurrection

IN the Rabbinic literature (Tanh. 6:32a), Rabbi Simeon ben Laqish is reported as praising the one who takes on the commitment to the kingdom of God without having seen what happened on Mount Sinai. In much the same way, Jesus says to Thomas, 'Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe.' In this episode we are possibly dealing with not only Thomas's doubts – his need for physical proof – but the doubts of the early community, and others thereafter. Thomas's doubts could be met with the opportunity to plunge – which is the force of the verb – his hand into the side of the wounded Saviour. There is no indication that Thomas carried out the physical examination. It was surely enough for him to encounter the Risen Lord.

The doubts of the early community, a gathering which would comprise mostly those who were not physical witnesses of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection, could not be dealt with by the opportunity to test out the evidence for themselves in this way. Similarly, at some historical distance, we too will have our doubts, doubts which cannot be dealt with by raw proof. To all of us, Christ says 'Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe.' We are called to choose between *pistos* and *apistos* – nouns found only in the Gospel of St John – between being a 'believer' or being an 'unbeliever'. We notice that so-called 'Doubting Thomas' gives us one of the two strongest statements of faith in Jesus as Son of God. The first statement 'the Word was with God and the Word was God' begins the Fourth Gospel (John 1:1). The second is nearly at the end (John 20:28): 'My Lord and my God'. In the earlier version of the Roman Missal translated into English, we were told that this is what we would say in response to 'the Mystery of Faith'
